

ASSIGNED

God has not only called you to run the race, He has personally assigned the course. Long before you ever took your first spiritual step, the Lord determined where your race would begin, where it would lead, what valleys it would pass through, and where it would ultimately end. That truth changes everything about the way we endure.

If you have ever watched a track meet, you know that runners do not gather before the race and negotiate their lanes. They do not move the starting line, shorten the distance, or decide that one lane looks easier than another. Everything has already been measured. The lanes have already been marked, and the officials have determined exactly where each runner belongs. Their responsibility is not to redesign the course but simply to run it.

That picture serves as an excellent illustration of the Christian life.

Throughout this study, Hebrews 12:1–2 will be our foundation, so I encourage you to become very familiar with these verses. Every lesson we study will, in one way or another, return to this passage. Notice what the writer says: "Let us run with endurance the race that is set before us." There is so much packed into that single statement.

First, what are we told to do? Run. Scripture never pictures the Christian life as passive. The word translated run carries the idea of moving with urgency and determined effort.

It was even used in Greek literature to describe someone fleeing danger with everything they had. The Christian life is not casual. We are not wandering aimlessly through life hoping we eventually reach heaven. We are moving forward with purpose, intentionally pursuing Christ every step of the way.

Second, how are we to run? With endurance. Endurance is steadfastness. It is remaining faithful when quitting would seem easier. It is the settled determination to continue following Christ regardless of opposition, suffering, disappointment, or delay. Anyone can run when the path is smooth, but endurance is revealed when the course becomes difficult.

Then we arrive at perhaps the most encouraging phrase in the verse: "the race that is set before us." The words set before mean appointed, placed, or assigned. In other words, someone else determined the course. God did not simply save you and then wait to see how your life unfolded. He was never surprised by your circumstances, your family, your gifts, your hardships, your disappointments, or your opportunities. Before your story ever unfolded, He had already written it.

That means your race is not accidental. It is providential. The Lord Himself marked out your course.

When difficult seasons come, we often find ourselves asking, "Why is this happening to me?"

Yet Hebrews quietly reminds us that our race has been set before us by a sovereign God who sees the beginning and the end at the same time. He knows every mile before we ever reach it.

Psalm 90 builds on this same truth. Moses reminds us that the Lord numbers our days and teaches us to number them as well. Think about that for a moment. God has already determined the length of our race. Some believers run many decades. Others complete their course in what seems to us a very short time. Yet every day belongs to Him.

Moses does not ask the Lord for more days. Instead, he asks for wisdom to live well within the days he has been given. Then he prays that the Lord would establish the work of his hands. What a beautiful prayer for every runner: "Lord, if today is one of the miles You have assigned me, help me make it count."

We often spend tremendous energy wishing for tomorrow while overlooking the opportunity of today. Yet endurance is never built tomorrow; it is built in today's obedience. Every ordinary day matters. Every unseen act of faithfulness matters. Every quiet decision to obey Christ matters because every mile has been placed there by God Himself.

Paul echoes this truth in 1 Corinthians 7 when he writes, "Only let each person lead the life that the Lord has assigned to him, and to which God has called him." That verse should cause every believer to stop and think. The Lord has assigned a life to me. He has entrusted me with a particular family, particular gifts, particular opportunities, particular hardships, and a particular ministry. My assignment will not look exactly like yours because God never intended it to.

Sometimes believers become discouraged because their blueprint is difficult. We imagine that if God truly loved us, He would surely choose an easier path. Yet Jesus promised the opposite. He told His disciples they would experience persecution and warned that the world would hate them because it first hated Him. Walking with Christ has always placed believers at odds with a fallen world.

Not every road is easy, but every road is known. Nothing catches the Lord by surprise. When hard seasons arrive, we do not need to understand every detail of the course. We simply need to lift our eyes above the course and fix them on the One who designed it. Our perspective changes when we stop asking, "Why this road?" and begin asking, "Lord, how do You want me to honor You on this road?"

That heavenly perspective grows even deeper when we remember how personally God designed us. Psalm 139 tells us that we were fearfully and wonderfully made. David describes himself as being intricately woven together by the Lord. The language pictures an artisan carefully embroidering every detail with skill and intention. Then David says that all the days ordained for him were written before one of them came to be.

Not only did God form you, He formed your days. He designed your personality, your gifts, your strengths, and even the experiences that would shape your life. Nothing about you is random.

Paul says something remarkably similar in Ephesians 2:10: "We are His workmanship." The Greek word is *poiēma*. It describes something handcrafted by a skilled artist and is the word from which we get our English word poem. Every believer is a unique masterpiece crafted by the Creator Himself. Then Paul says that God prepared good works beforehand so that we would walk in them.

Notice the order. God first designed the runner, then He designed the race. The One who knows exactly how He created you also knows exactly what course He has prepared for you. Your gifts fit your calling because both came from the same Designer.

Yet despite knowing these truths, we often find ourselves looking sideways instead of forward. One of the clearest examples appears at the end of John's Gospel. Jesus has just restored Peter after his devastating denial. Then He begins describing Peter's future ministry and even hints at the suffering that will accompany it.

Peter immediately looks at John and asks, "Lord, what about this man?"

It is such a familiar question. What about his race? Why does her life seem easier? Why does their ministry seem larger? Why does that family appear blessed while mine struggles?

Comparison has a way of stealing endurance because it shifts our focus away from Christ and onto other runners.

Jesus answered Peter with words every believer needs to hear: "What is that to you? You follow Me."

In other words, Peter's assignment was not John's assignment. John's blueprint was not Peter's blueprint. Each man had been given his own course to run, and the same is true for us.

We waste precious energy when we compare our lane to someone else's. We compare gifts, opportunities, families, finances, ministries, personalities, and seasons of life. Before long, we are studying someone else's race more than we are faithfully running our own. The Lord never called us to run another person's course. He called us to lead the life He assigned to us.

There is tremendous peace in surrendering to God's sovereignty over your story. Not because every chapter is easy or every mile makes sense, but because the Author can always be trusted. One day every faithful runner will cross the finish line and finally see what we cannot yet see today. Every difficult mile, every painful season, every delayed answer, and every hidden act of obedience will have been used by the Lord to accomplish His perfect purpose.
